First Reading: Acts 3:13a, 18

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles:

Peter said, "It is the God of Sarah and Abraham, Rebecca and Isaac, Leah and Rachel and Jacob, the God of our ancestors, who has glorified Jesus.

"You are the heirs of the prophets, the heirs of the Covenant the Most High made with our ancestors when God told Sarah and Abraham, 'In your offspring all the families of the earth will be blessed.' It was for you that God raised up and sent this Jesus, to bless you.

Gospel Reading: Mk 16:13-14; Lk 24:35-48

A reading from the Holy Gospels according to Mark and Luke:

After the risen Jesus appeared to his disciple, Mary Magdalene, he appeared in another form to two other disciples walking along on their way to the country. They returned and told the others; but they did not believe them either. ...

While the disciples were still talking about the reports of Jesus appearing to some of their number, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you."

They were startled and frightened, thinking they saw a ghost. Jesus said to them, "Why are you troubled? Why do doubts rise in your minds? Look at my hands and my feet. It is I myself! Touch me and see; a ghost does not have flesh and bones, as you see I have."

After saying this, he showed them his hands and feet. And while they still did not believe it because of joy and amazement, he asked them, "Do you have anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate it in their presence.

He said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you, that everything written about me in the law of Moses and in the prophets and psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures. And he said to them, "Thus it is written that the Christ would suffer and rise from the dead on the third day and that repentance, for forgiveness, would be preached in his name to all the nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."

Contemporary Reading: Vision and Viewpoint, April 2, 2024: *a weekly e-newsletter*, by Joan Chittister

An excerpt from *In Search of Belief* by Joan Chittister:

Resurrection testifies to the metamorphosis of the Jesus of history to the Christ of faith. It is about coming to grips with the transformed and transforming presence of Christ then, now, and always. Once that happens, life is never again the same. Life begins anew.

To say, "I believe in Jesus Christ...who rose from the dead," then, is to say I believe that the Resurrection goes on and on and on forever. Every time Jesus rises in our own hearts in new ways, the Resurrection happens again. Every time we see Jesus where we did not recognize him before—in the faces of the poor, in the love of the unloved, in the revelatory moments of life, Jesus rises anew. But that is not all. The real proof of the Resurrection lies not in the transformation of Jesus alone, but the transformation awaiting us who accept it.

Homily/Reflection: Donna M. Mazzola

After the death of Jesus, his followers are troubled. They have doubts. Mary of Magdala and the disciples on the road try to explain, Jesus is alive. But it's too tough to fathom. Then, in the midst of their disbelief, Jesus shows up and greets them, "Peace be with you. Why are you troubled, why the doubts? Come, touch me; my hands, my feet, see for yourself. It is me." What's more, he asks for something to eat. And before their eyes, he consumes broiled fish. He has a body.

The appearances of the Risen Christ that we are hearing about for the third week now—these accounts of his resurrection—are not only about the transformation of Jesus. These events are transforming his followers, one by one. An encounter with Him ignites a slow burning in their hearts. He is rising in their hearts in new ways. And they are no longer the same.

This experience also belongs to us. We were not there, yet somehow, we are rooted in this same faith. Why? It's because we too have a story—our own encounter with the living Christ. We too believe because we see. We too witness the signs of hope, moments of recognizing the living Christ in people's faces and hearts. Moments of truth-telling and reparation. Moments of forgiveness and reunion, of disarmament and peace-making, like these:

The descendent of an enslaved person meets the descendent of a slaveowner. Each tells the other their story. They weep and embrace when they meet on the land her ancestors worked, the plantation his ancestors owned.

Palestinian and Israeli teens use art, rap, song, and dance to rage for peace, for a new way of living together.

A space is made in Canada for survivors of Indian Residential Schools to finally speak their truth and be heard. It is only the beginning, but First Nations, Inuit, and Metis Peoples are telling their perspective of history.

Listening means recognizing the beauty and wisdom of Indigenous ways of seeing and caring for creation.

Those we encounter bear the presence of Christ. And we recognize Jesus in the faces and bodies of the suffering, voiceless, wounded, and burdened. Then he shows us there's another way. We can rise up and heal each other.

Recently, during a morning walk, on a path that I have taken over 100 times, I noticed the bark of a sweet gum tree. I stopped. At eye level I saw a heart-shaped knot. It's been there all along, yet I've never noticed it before. As I continued to walk, the image of the knot worked on me. Why hadn't I noticed it before? Suddenly I could see what I didn't see before. What changed? It was happening to me. I was in it, like the total eclipse visible to many of us in North America and other locations. We had read all about it ahead of time, but being in it was dumbfounding. Being in it meant experiencing it. And it is in the seeing, in the recognizing, that we are transformed. If I could see the heart of that sweet gum, then maybe I have the capacity to recognize the heart of Christ in everyone and everything. This is how transformation happens.

You're invited to share where or how you recognize the Christ in your ordinary life.

Holding all our shared thoughts in the sacred space among us, let us now proclaim our affirmation of faith:

Affirmation of Faith:

- **3.** We believe in the Holy One, a Divine Mystery beyond all definition and rational understanding, the heart of all that has ever existed, that exists now, or that ever will exist.
- **4.** We believe in Jesus, messenger of the Divine Word, bringer of healing, heart of Divine compassion, bright star in the firmament of the Holy One's prophets, mystics, and saints.
- **5.** We believe that we are called to follow Jesus as a vehicle of Divine love, a source of wisdom and truth, and an instrument of peace in the world.
- **6.** We believe in the Spirit of the Holy One, the life that is our innermost life, the breath moving in our being, the depth of living in each of us.

7. We believe that the Compassion and Companionship of Jesus is here and now, stretched out all around us to empower those with eyes to see it, hearts to receive it, and hands to make it happen. Amen.

Prayer of the Faithful

Ever present Creator: Redeeming Word: Ruah, Breath of Life, we stand present at our Tables holding our blessings, cares, and concerns. We ask that your healing power become a cleansing balm upon the Spirit within us, our families, our country, our leaders, and our world. After each request, we respond:

Risen Jesus, we awaken to your call!

For whom or for what shall we pray?

All knowing and ever living Source of Light, we give back to you what you have so graciously given to each of us. We trust that by breaking open our hearts, our lives will bear fruit. We hope that by following Jesus' lead, we will fall in love with the Spirit that dwells within us and thereby love all whom we touch. Seed of Compassion, hold these prayers, and the prayers hidden deep within our hearts not yet ready to surface, within your ever-loving embrace. Amen.

LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

Sign of Peace

As we prepare for the sacred meal, we reaffirm that just as Jesus was anointed, so is each of us. And so, we celebrate our Creator's fruitful love as we extend our blessing to one another with joy. May the peace that our risen brother, Jesus, offers be always with us! Amen.

Offertory (All raise the bread and cup)

We place on our plate the harvest to be won by labor's love. And into the cup we pour all the sap which is to be pressed out this day from the Earth's fruits.

- **ALL**: O Gracious One, giver of the gifts we bring, receive them from all those gathered here today, affirming the sacrament of your Presence among us.
 - 1. Holy Mystery, may our strength be renewed by your generous blessings that will bring us health of mind and body. Grant that the healing work which you have begun in the life, death, and rising again of Jesus, bring us to eternal life in Your Presence. We ask this through Jesus, our brother. Amen.

The Holy One is with us, abounding in Love!

2. Giving thanks to the Source of All Life, we open our hearts in the name of Jesus, who lives and loves, heals and empowers through us.

3. We praise you, O God of wonder and life, with greater joy than ever during this Easter Season, as we celebrate Jesus' life and ministry as witness to the life of compassion and love we are all called to live. As the universe resounds with Easter joy, we lift up our hearts with the choirs of angels and sing this endless hymn of your glory:

- **4.** Loving Creator, we see around us the work of your hands, the fruit of your wisdom and love. The unfolding story of creation witnesses unceasingly to your creative power. We, your creatures, often deviate from that wisdom, hindering your creative presence in our midst.
- **5.** Sending among us Jesus, our Light and Hope, you birth afresh in our world the power of Sophia Wisdom, and in the gift of this Spirit, your creative goodness blooms anew, amid the variety and wonder of life.
- **ALL:** Generous Gifter of Life, make us ever more aware of the presence of Your Spirit in these, our gifts, as we celebrate the +transformative energy within this bread and fruit of the vine given to nurture afresh in us, the discerning gifts of wisdom, light, and truth.
 - **6.** As a Christian people we celebrate the Open Table, proclaimed by Jesus our liberator and our friend, a Table of abundant life, inclusive love, and liberation, where all are welcome, and from which no one is to be excluded.

On the night before he died, Jesus did more than ask us to remember him. He showed us how to live when he washed the feet of his friends. At the Table, he

took the Passover Bread, spoke the grace, broke the bread and offers it to us now, saying:

ALL: Take and eat, all of you. This is my very Self, the Bread of Life given to strengthen you. (All raise bread)

Jesus then raised a cup of blessing, spoke the grace, and offers it to us now, saying:

ALL: Take and drink of this Cup of my life-blood, the Covenant made new again through my life in you. Whenever you remember me like this, I am among you. (All raise cup)

We raise our voices to the sacred presence of our Loving God:

ALL: In every creature that has ever breathed, *Christ has lived*In every living being that has passed on before us, *Christ is transformed*In our breaking open the word and the bread, *Christ is with us still!*In everything yet to be, *Christ will come again*.

(All raise bread and cup)

ALL: For it is through learning to live as Jesus lived,
And why he lived,
And for whom he lived,
That we awaken to your Spirit within,
Moving us to worship you truly,
Life-giving God,
At this time and all time and in all ways.

Cantor: Amen! (x2)

Communion Rite - We pray as this bread and cup are shared among us:

- **7.** Loving God, you call us to live the Gospel of peace and justice. *We will live justly.*
- **1.** Loving God, you call us to be your presence in the world. *We will love tenderly.*
- **2.** Loving God, you call us to speak truth to power. We will walk with integrity in your presence.

This is the Bread and Cup of Life, through which we are nourished, and we nourish one another.

ALL: We share this bread and fruit of the vine today committing ourselves to

be Easter people, people who see beyond the barriers, the pain, the darkness and hard times, people who live in faith, hope and love in all the seasons of our lives whatever the ups and downs.

ALL: ...not worried, not threatening, just shining like the sun, like a starry night, like a lamp on a stand, a light for life. Amen.
